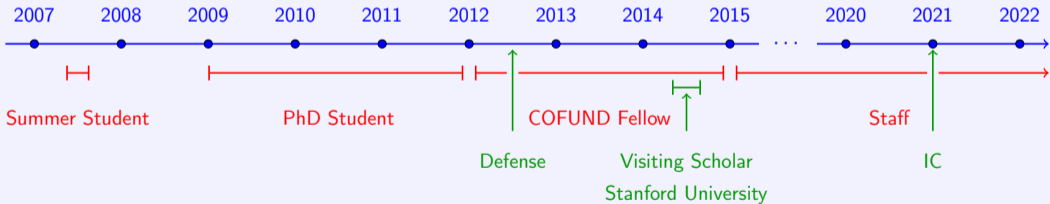

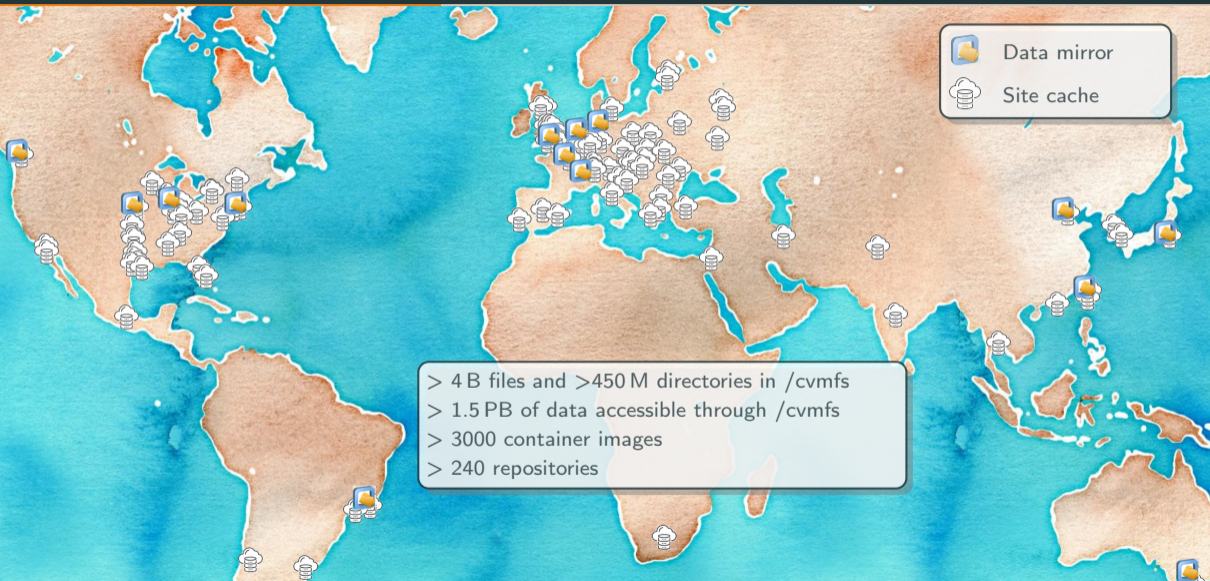
Global-scale file system to access scientific software

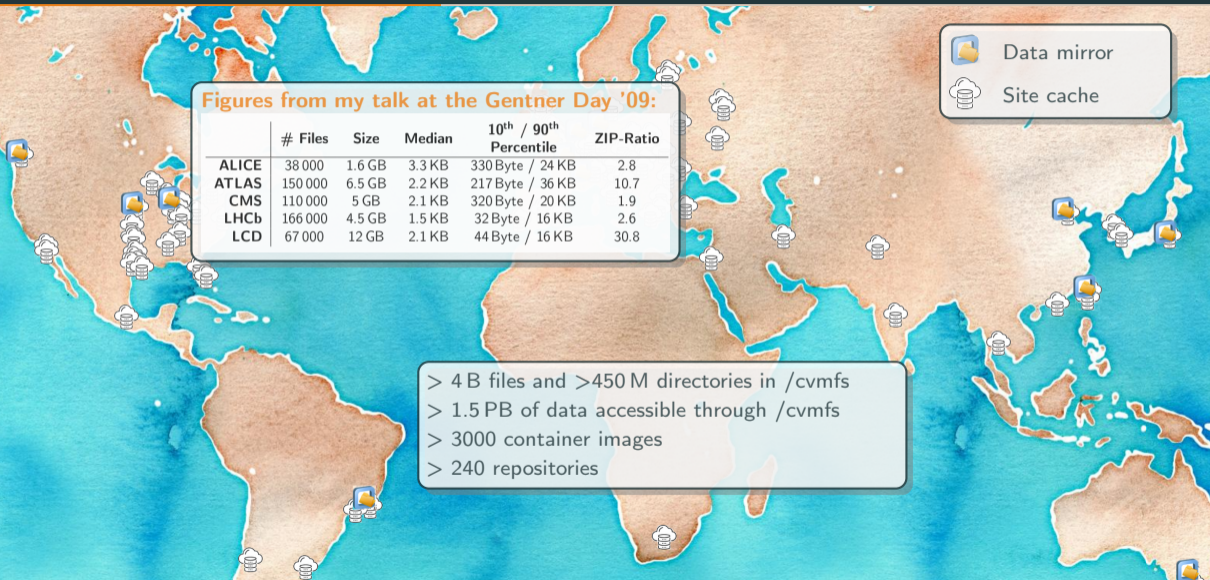
Replacing application distribution by pre-built bundles (container, package, ...)

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Research: looking behind the scenes

- What is the problem we haven't understood?
- What have others done?
Why didn't it work?
- Meticulously collect facts and numbers
- Comprehensive answer to a (narrow) question


Reading and listening

- Always have a few recent papers on your desk – and read them
- Build your own bibliography (BIBTEX)
- Look out for: CERN academic training, computing seminar, summer student lectures, CERN schools, home university seminars

Great opportunity to look around and build your toolbox

- Programming languages, L^AT_EX, git, LabView, plotting tools, test beam, control room shifts, ...

Writing and presenting

- Useful notes: lab notebook, list of presentations, short write-ups
- Occasionally present outside your day-to-day peers
- Writing takes time, last 6 months usually reserved for thesis



Peer Group

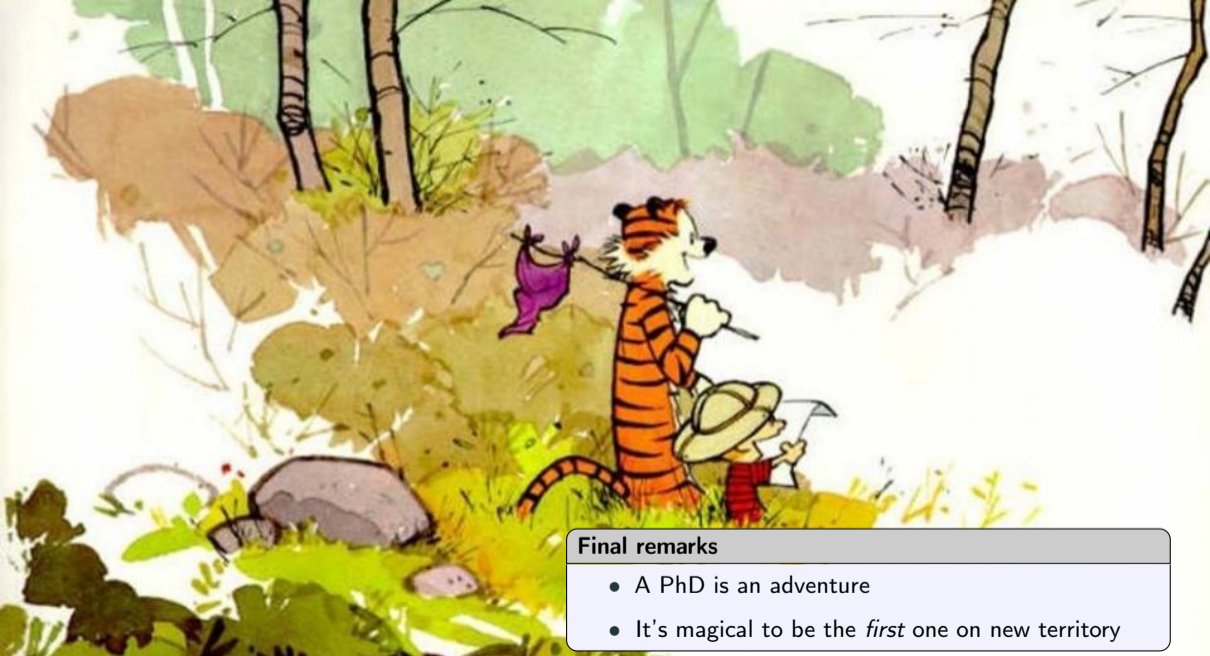
- Missing the typical university group biotope

Post Doc Career

- Very good starting position for a career at CERN: you know the place and people know you
- If you intend to stay, let your group know early
