

Tips and Advices

- Networking on a professional level but especially seeking exchange with other expats/spouses – but don't only surround yourself with other expats especially only the ones from your home country
- Have your linkedIn and application documents up to date
- Also consider remote jobs at companies outside the Geneva area to start with
- Patience finding/getting a job in the area takes time Don't give up! It took me several applications at CERN til I got accepted
- Keep yourself busy, find new hobbies
- Invest in education, especially language skills
- Enjoy the area and make the most of your time here
- Stay connected to family and friends back home and try to plan regular visits
- Don't think that because your CV is not like the norm/you have had a longer break in your career that it lowers your chances in the job market – Being an expat and living abroad qualifies you in many different areas
- Keep checking the CERN career website as career opportunities are published all the time
