

Summary and Key Takeaways

- We had **45 participants in-person and 8 online** from industry, academia, the UN and non-forprofit organizations. They represent the diversity of the ecosystem working in developing diverse QC educational resources for different skills and different audiences
- We agreed that education is a key pillar to the success of OQI, supporting OQI's mission to provide access for all at the nexus of the SDGs and quantum computing
- It was agreed also that the audience of the educational offering should be focused on **underserved communities** in countries.
- One of the key points of the workshop was the **endorsement of an educational consortium,** with representatives present from the different communities/sectors that would come together, share resources, set goals, define the audience for each of the tasks, produce education programs and the implementation of these programs → keeping in mind these points:
 - We confirmed the **relevance of focusing on the creation of new educational tools and initiatives by OQI** at the nexus of SDGs and quantum computing and agreed on the next steps
 - We are not reinventing the wheel, OQI can **leverage existing content**, including ours, which we are committed to put at its disposal and build a **repository**
 - OQI must **vet for the quality of the content it disseminates**, our group is here to support that, but OQI will also need the active participation of external experts
- At the workshop, the majority endorsed that the **process should be bottom up**, focusing use cases brought up by local participants, empowering these local communities to come up with their own problems and uses cases, making sure that theses use cases will remain in the country to inspire these communities, to avoid the brain drain.
- We highlighted the use of **appropriate access language** to deliver to the specific audience.
- We agreed that we collectively have a responsibility to make this educational content available to the largest part of humanity, that this is an essential condition to **try bridging a new digital divide**
