Update on Drupal (1/4)

Changes to PHP / Drupal timeline!

- Change in the life-cycle of PHP releases, extending security support for all releases by **one year**
- **Good news!**
 - **Gives us more time to focus on WordPress**
 - **No upgrades for the foreseeable future**
- We will monitor and reserve resources in case some upgrades still need to happen next year (PHP 8.1 EOL)

Web Governance Board April 26th 2024

Next Steps: Changes (1/2)

- **Drupal 10 will be supported until June 2026**
 -  Block customisation on new Drupal websites; *planned from April 10*
 -  Block additional customisation on all WordPress websites; *from April 10*

If any additional functionality is required, users should open a ticket
- The Drupal infrastructure will transition to maintenance mode, freeing resources
- Service changes will ease the subsequent migration to WordPress

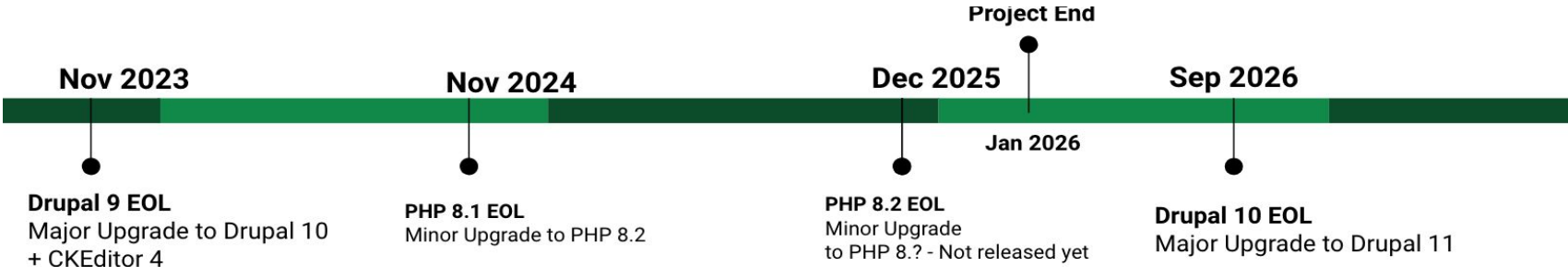
What can be done today?

Assess and uninstall non-essential custom modules

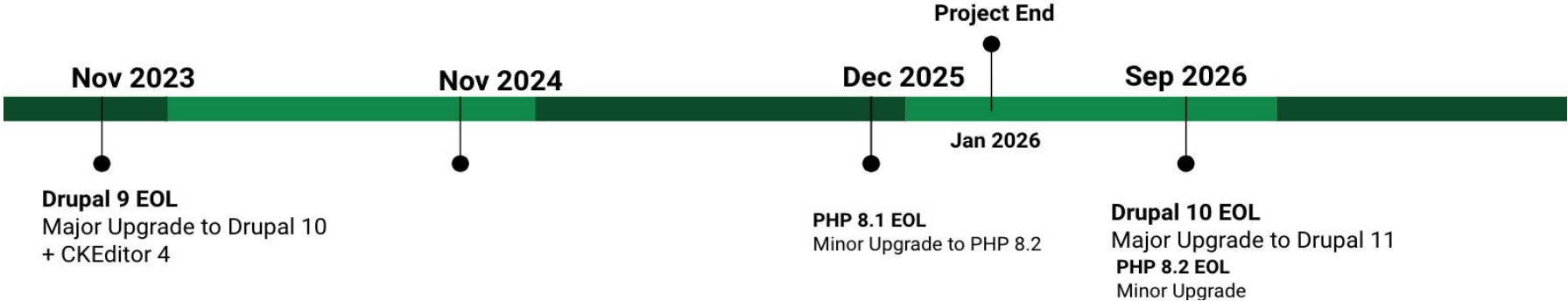

No changes to Drupal 10 lifecycle

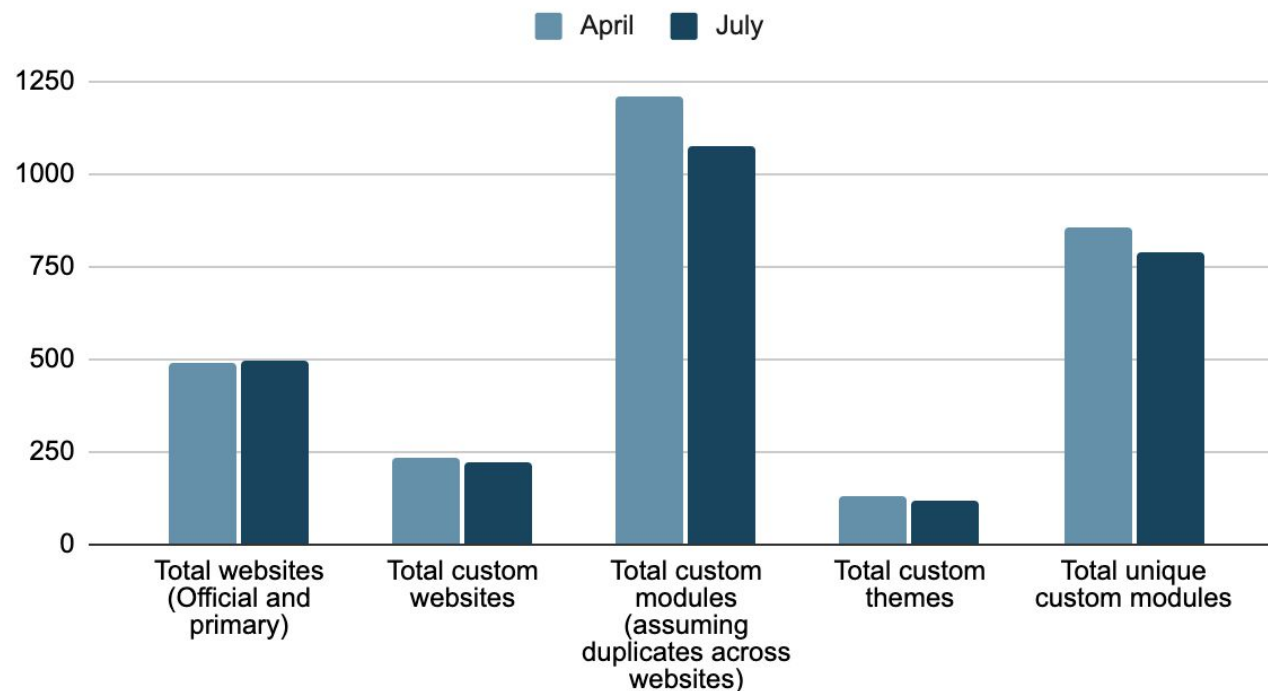

Update on Drupal (3/4)

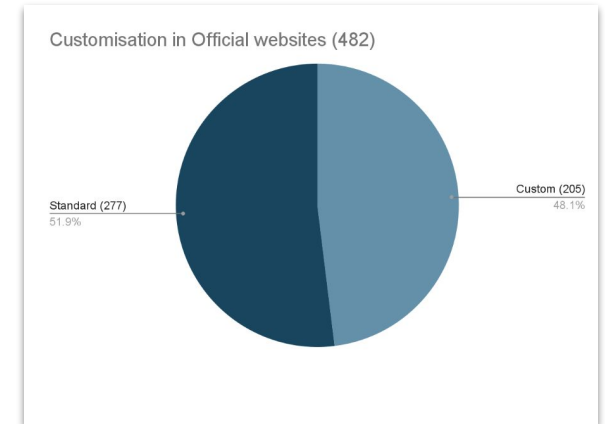
In April, website owners were asked to remove non-essential customisations

- Next phase focusing on security, “audit” and follow-up with the support from CSO

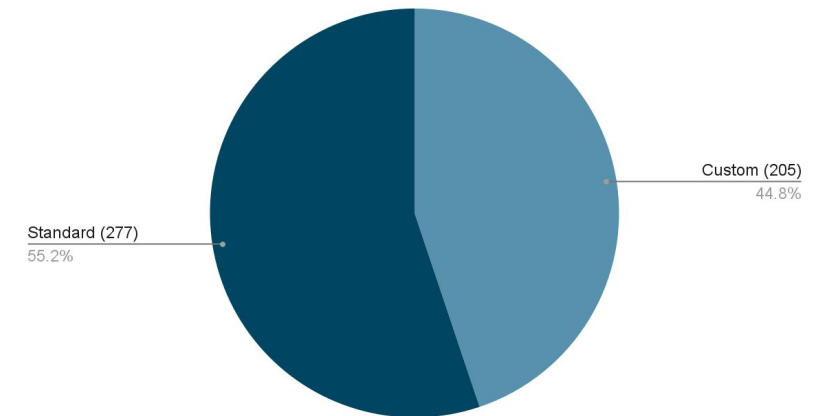
Customisation update (July)

Update on Drupal (4/4)

In summary

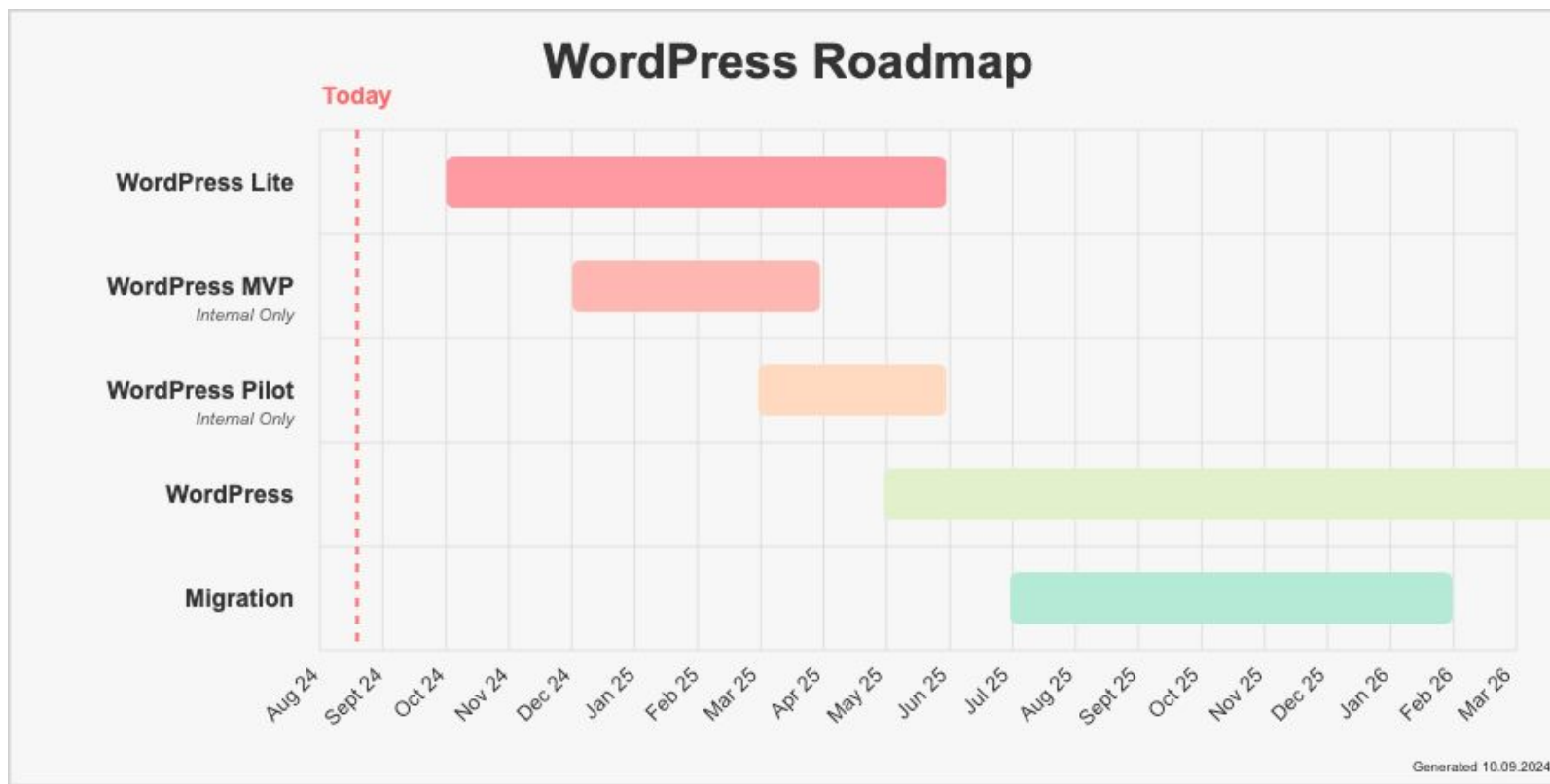
- Drupal 10 will **continue** to be supported until its decommission at CERN (Feb 2026)
 - Security patches will be pushed at similar pace as today
 - We will group remaining releases as much as possible to reduce work
 - Ultimately, service is in maintenance mode: **no new features**
- On the current infrastructure, **no customisation allowed on new websites**

The best thing a Drupal website owner can do today is to ensure conformance with the CERN Drupal Distribution by removing non-essential custom modules

WordPress Roadmap (2/2)

- **WordPress Lite** (October 2024): A lightweight version of WordPress offering an initial set of plugins and the first version of our official CERN WordPress theme running on the existing `app-catalogue` infrastructure. This offering will provide a simple and accessible way for website owners to familiarise themselves with WordPress.
- *WordPress MVP (December 2024): Internal version of the WordPress infrastructure available to the Web Team for development*
- *WordPress Pilot (March 2025): Internal version of the WordPress infrastructure available to the Web Team for development*
- **WordPress** (May 2025): WordPress becomes generally available to everyone at CERN
- **Migration** (July 2025): We begin automated migrations from Drupal to WordPress

WordPress Lite (1/2)

- It is a preview of what is to come
 - Will include initial set of Gutenberg-blocks, initial CERN WordPress theme
 - Expect changes and updates to the WordPress Lite offering in the months to come
- It is **your chance** to help shape the WordPress experience at CERN
- Will be open to all and we hope to facilitate as much feedback as possible
- If you need a WordPress website now, WordPress Lite is the answer
- WordPress Lite is **not meant** for high-visibility or .cern websites
 - Will not use central services (e.g. DBoD)

WordPress Lite (2/2)

- **Disclaimer:** WordPress Lite is **not the final** solution and **will be decommissioned**
 - Once central WordPress is available (May 2025), WordPress Lite websites must migrate
 - If your website conforms, we will handle it automatically without any action needed
- **Existing WordPress websites** will co-exist with WordPress Lite
 - You will benefit from everything WordPress Lite offers, but we will not overwrite existing customisation
 - Your responsibility to remove existing customisation in order to conform with WordPress Lite
- As soon as Lite is released (October 2024), existing WordPress users are encouraged to adapt their websites to use only the plugins centrally provided
 - We will be in touch with owners on how to achieve this

WordPress Goals


- Working in parallel with external resources, we have extracted and analysed Drupal websites
- We want to **streamline**, **simplify**, and take the opportunity to **remove unused elements**, analysing
 - **1073** custom Drupal modules
 - **738** custom Drupal content types
 - **644** custom roles and **1705** permissions
- We focus exclusively on what is actually being used (i.e. published content and recently edited)
- Not necessary to map Drupal *modules* with WordPress *plugins* 1:1
- Instead, focus on mapping Drupal *content types* to WordPress content

Instead of migrating more than a decade of customisation, poor habits and implementations,

how can we reduce complexity and ease WordPress adoption?

Website owners should become content creators

Dark matter

Galaxies in our universe seem to be achieving an impossible feat. They are rotating with such speed that the gravity generated by their observable matter could not possibly hold them together; they should have torn themselves apart long ago. The same is true of galaxies in clusters, which leads scientists to believe that something we cannot see is at work. They think something we have yet to detect directly is giving these galaxies extra mass, generating the extra gravity they need to stay intact. This strange and unknown matter was called “dark matter” since it is not visible.

Unlike normal matter, dark matter does not interact with the electromagnetic force. This means it does not absorb, reflect or emit light, making it extremely hard to spot. In fact, researchers have been able to infer the existence of dark matter only from the aravitational effect it seems to have on visible matter.

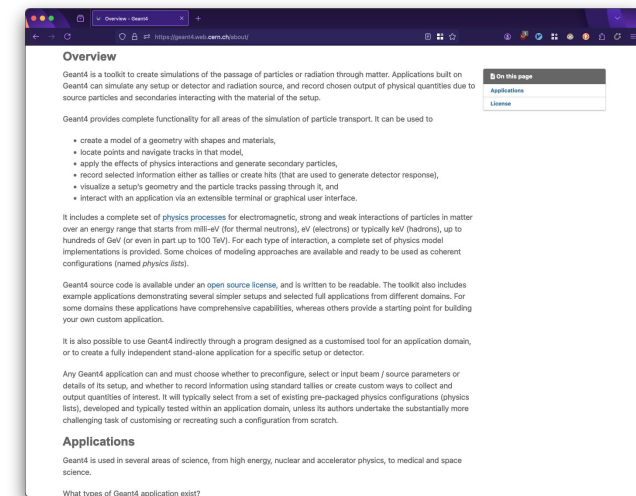
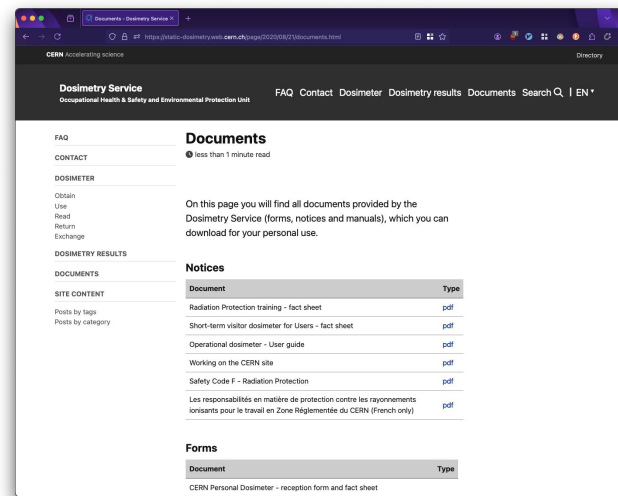
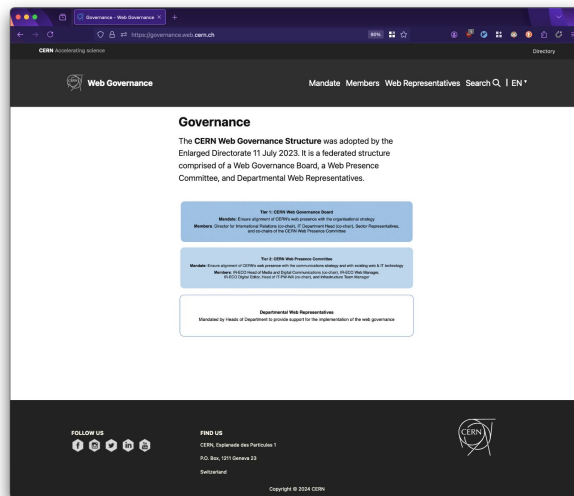

- Will become available at the same time as WordPress Lite

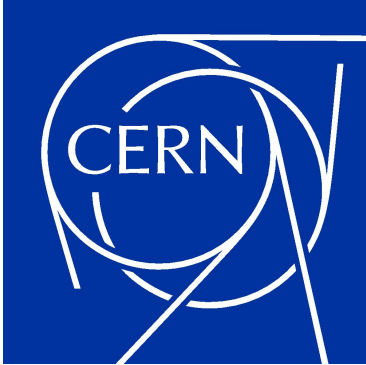


Summary
