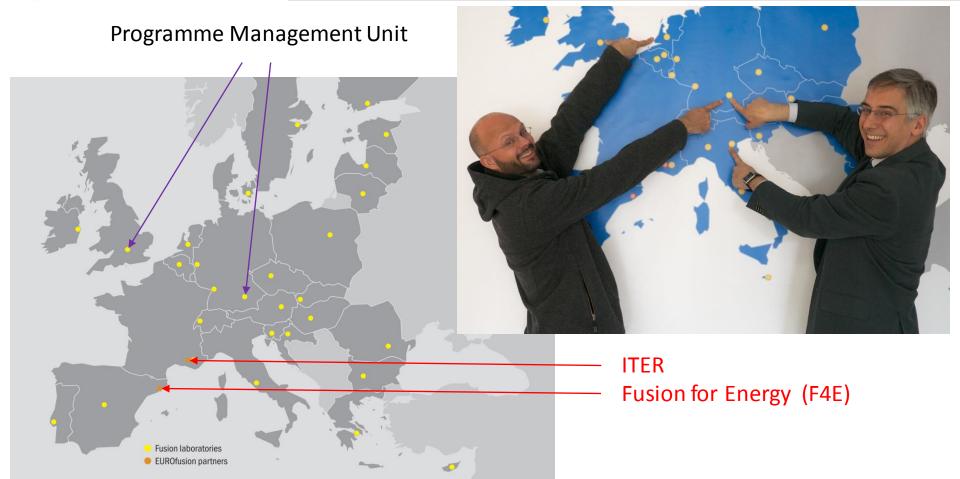

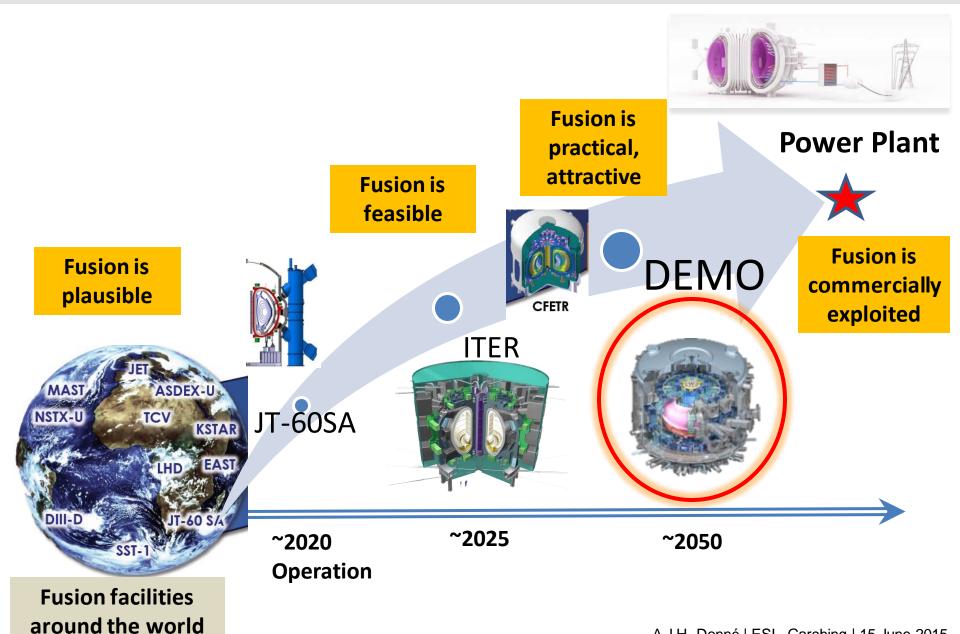


All EU Member States plus Switzerland have joined the EUROfusion agreement involving 29 fusion laboratories and numerous Third Parties.

Their combined effort will achieve the ultimate goal: fusion electricity by 2050

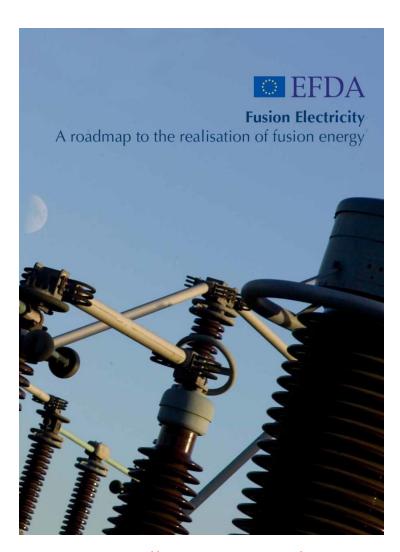
Roadmap towards fusion electricity

Three periods

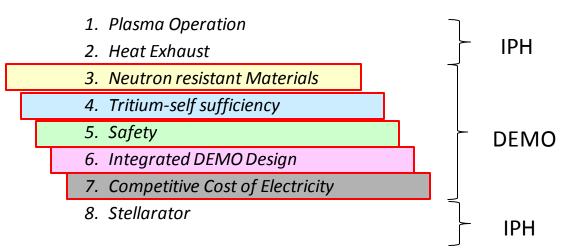
- 2014 2020 (Building ITER & Supporting Experiments)
- 2021 2030 (Exploiting ITER and Designing DEMO)
- 2031 2050(Building and Exploiting DEMO)

8 Strategic Missions to tackle the critical challenges for Fusion:



Emphasis on:

- Central role of ITER
- DEMO as a single step to commercial fusion power plants that produce electricity and have a closed fuel cycle
- DEMO construction starting early in the 2030s
- Pragmatic Approach: It should not be perfect but good enough and must come on time to make an impact
