The LaTeX Template

- By definition, the LaTeX template is perfect!
- Authors do not appear to be trying to override the template vertical white spacing settings so much as before.
- Major problems continue to be:
 - Failing to typeset the title in upper case.
 - Not forcing letters to lower case in the title and section headings where appropriate (i.e. TeV, not TEV) using \lowercase{}.
 - Not capitalizing the initial letter of significant words in the subsection headings.
 - Incorrect figure, table and equation referencing in the text.
 - Incorrect capitalization in table captions.
 - Incorrect indentation and formats in the references.

Template versus Skeleton

- At present the so-called LaTeX templates are really a set of typesetting instructions.
- Perhaps they should be reworded and expanded to explicitly refer to LaTeX conventions and not mention MS Word instructions.
- These instructions should be available on the JACoW template page as a PDF file (accompanying a similar MS Word document).
- The US Letter and A4 .tex files should then be drastically reduced in length to become skeleton files. These would contain the bare minimum of text and coding to aid using them as a starting point for preparing papers. The different environments would have single words within their braces, as in \title{Title}, to demonstrate their usage but still be executable. Authors would then substitute their own text.
