

- 54 responses, about 50%!


"Did you like it?"





- "more on algorithms, in particular ML"; "more on I/O"; "evolution of I/O and User Interfaces"
- "No graphics next time. Plotting diagrams is the most boring session."
- "Usage of ROOT in individual analysis groups"; "reports from experiments"
- "Interoperability with / in FOSS software"; "generalization of ROOT tools for outside of HEP"
- "theory of ROOT: guiding principles for development and use"

"How can we advertise the next workshop better?"

- We did well for ATLAS, people notices posters @ CERN
- Clarify intent / scope (versus "workshop")
- More aggressive ads on websites (root.cern, forum)
- Social media
- Local media

"How else can we improve the next workshop?"

- More discussion time versus talk time: "Wednesday felt very exhausting (I count 27 presentations!)"
- Podium discussion; organize small discussion groups:
 - "a big part of us were only users and felt a bit overwhelmed by the experts
 discussion while, during coffee breaks, I could see them all interacting and
 telling their experiences / problems."; "physicist instead of a programmer, so
 part of these presentations is not so interesting due to it being too advanced for
 me"
 - "This event would in this case also have been great to showcase some of the new features in ROOT6.14/7, as some might be lost on the not so advanced users."

"How else can we improve the next workshop?"

- Separate novice-level talks from experts' talks; level too high for PhD students for some presentations; "Not encourage people presenting their very first steps in the world of programming"
- Live ROOT coding; interactive parts; training ("to attract younger audience")
- "Maybe be you should organise feedback sessions of smaller size on shorter basis then few years."
- "Awards (e.g. ROOT mug)" for most active participant
